JUNE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON IMMUNIZATION PRACTICES MEETING - IMPORTANT UPDATES

The CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) met June 26-28. ACIP approved the following recommendations, which have been adopted by the CDC Director. They will be published in Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR) and reflected in CDC's print and digital resources in the coming months.

RSV Vaccines – Adults

- ACIP recommends adults 75 years of age and older receive a single dose of RSV vaccine.
- ACIP recommends adults 60 through 74 years of age and older who are at increased risk of severe RSV disease receive a single dose of RSV vaccine.
- RSV vaccination is recommended as a single lifetime dose only, *persons who have already received RSV vaccination are NOT recommended to receive another dose.*
- These recommendations replace the current recommendation that adults 60 years of age and older may receive RSV vaccination, using shared clinical decision-making.

COVID-19 Vaccines

- ACIP recommends 2024-2025 COVID-19 vaccines as authorized or approved by FDA in persons 6 months of age and older.
 - 2024-2025 COVID-19 vaccines will be available from Moderna, Novavax, and Pfizer in the fall of 2024.
- Providers may still administer 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine if it is not expired at their discretion. CDC will provide further direction in the future about disposing of the 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine.

DTaP-IPV-Hib-HepB (Vaxelis®) Vaccine

- ACIP recommends DTaP-IPV-Hib-HepB (Vaxelis®) be included with PRP-OMP (PedvaxHIB®) in the preferential recommendation for American Indian and Alaska Native infants based on the Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) component.

Influenza Vaccines

- ACIP reaffirms the recommendation for routine annual influenza vaccination of all persons aged 6 months and older who do not have contraindications.
- ACIP recommends high-dose inactivated (HD-IIV3) and adjuvanted inactivated (aIIV3) influenza vaccines as acceptable options for influenza vaccination of solid organ transplant recipients aged 18 through 64 years who are on immunosuppressive medication regimens, without a preference over other age-appropriate IIV3s or RIV3.
- All flu vaccines marketed in the U.S. for the 2024-2025 season will be trivalent.

Pneumococcal Vaccines

- ACIP recommends PCV21 (CAPVAXIVE™) as an option for adults aged 19 years and older who currently have a recommendation to receive a dose of PCV.

Dengue Vaccine (Dengvaxia®)

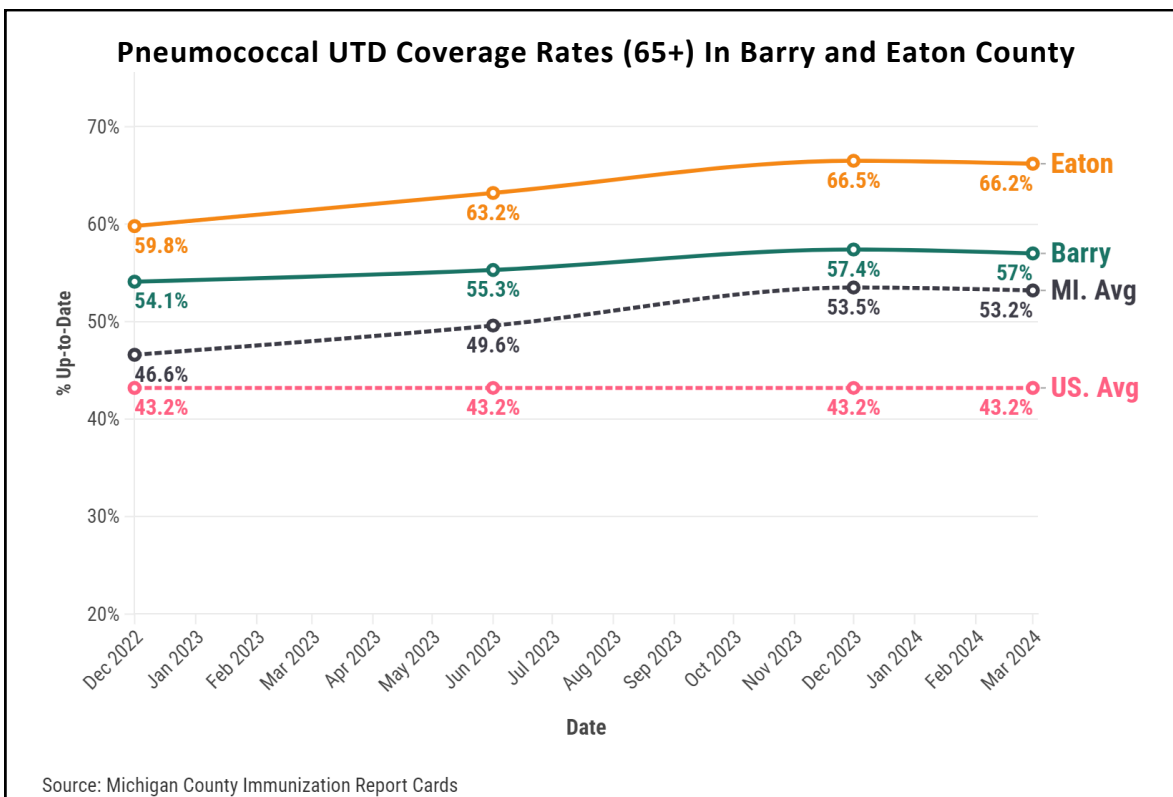
- Dengvaxia is being discontinued due to low demand.
