













# What's Bugging You?



## Bug Bites Decoded

Bug	Bite	What the Bite Looks Like	When to Seek Medical Treatment
 <b>Spider</b>		Red bump or blister; may turn into a sore or ulcer (with venomous spiders)	If pain worsens, area spreads or breaks down, or if you have nausea or muscle cramps
 <b>Mosquito</b>		Small, puffy, red bump with a puncture mark; often itchy	If bite becomes infected (increased redness, pus), or if you experience fever or body aches
 <b>Tick</b>		Often painless; tick may still be attached. Red bump or bullseye rash (in Lyme cases)	If rash develops, or if you feel fatigue, joint pain, or flu-like symptoms
 <b>Bed Bug</b>		Small, red, itchy bumps in a line or cluster, often on arms, neck, or back	If intense itching leads to infection, or if bites persist after home treatment
 <b>Flea</b>		Small red bumps, often on ankles or legs; may have a red "halo"	If severe allergic reaction or infected bites occur
 <b>Lice</b>		Itchy scalp or skin, visible nits (eggs) or crawling bugs in hair or on body	If lice persist after treatment or if scratching causes sores or infection
